
DEAD BIRDS WANTED

- Birds can get **West Nile virus** and other viruses from mosquito bites, causing some birds to die.
- Mosquitoes, not birds, infect people with West Nile virus.
- Tracking the virus in dead birds alerts the South Carolina Department of Public Health to virus activity in your area.
- Early warnings help local governments and mosquito control agencies protect people from getting sick or dying from West Nile virus.
